This organization started in 1998, and has been continually going strong since then. The first blanket that jump started this organization was one that was given to a 3-year-old girl that had been in and out of the hospital dealing with Leukemia. Since then, thousands of children have received blankets from Project Linus.

Each cheerleader from Cloverleaf High School brought in enough materials to make one tie blanket each to go along with the other donations the community had collected.

Where exactly did Cloverleaf get started on this project?

"I wanted the cheerleaders to participate in a community service project," said CHS cheerleading advisor Tonya Swain. "Helping seriously ill children is such a worthwhile cause. Just knowing that children will get the blankets and have some happiness makes me happy."

In the *Twitter* world, there are many celebrities that fans follow to



iPhone 6 Expected to Soar

Apple plans to add to their line of the famous iPhone, later this year.

One of the phones expected to come out is the new iPhone 6.

This new iPhone 6 is expected to come out, featuring a new array of colors. So far, the expected colors are black, white, silver, red, blue, and yellow.

This iPhone is expected to be a complete redesign from its predecessors.

The 6 will have two A6 processors or possibly an A7 processor. This means that the phone will be able to hold a massive amount of data. If all goes well with this new A7 processor it will be used in the next generation iPad as well.

This new screen will be that of a liquid type. The screen will be somewhat flexible and virually shatterproof. This new "flexible" screen will also make the phone easier to get in and out of pockets and purses as well.

Google Maps may also be a returning addition to the iPhone 6.

Apple and Google are in the works to

bring Google Maps back to the iPhone after much rejection of the Tom Tom map software used on the iPhone 5.

A 3D screen is also in the planned for the iPhone 6.

On Nov. 29, 2011, ABC Family renewed the series for a third season, consisting of 24 episodes (still airing). The third season premiered on June 5, 2012.

Alison was also stalked by A, and the girls continue to find more and more information about A and Alison's disappearance, all while risking their lives.
