Cedar Point Opening Day Just Around the Corner!

Cedar Point, located in Sandusky, Ohio by Lake Erie, is finally opening soon and everyone is getting excited for it. The opening day is Saturday, May 14.

Cedar Point is the second oldest amusement park in North America. With a history dating back to 1870, the classic amusement park on the shore of Lake Erie has seen its share of rides, roller coasters, trends and history.

There are many fun events that people love to go to that are held at Cedar Point. On May 20-22, it is student ID weekend. Students in kindergarten through college will be able to purchase a one-day admission ticket to Cedar Point for only \$31.99, a savings of \$15! There is also a scavenger hunt that offers valuable prizes as a reward.

Another event that most people love to go to is HalloWeekends from Sept. 16-Oct. 30 on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays. The weekends offer four haunted houses, five tremendously terrifying nighttime attractions, special entertainment and decorations, a parade and lots of daytime fun for kids.

The first roller coaster ever built at Cedar Point was the Switchback Railway in 1892, standing at 25-feet tall and reaching the top speed of 10 m.p.h. the oldest roller coaster still standing strong today is the Blue Streak,

built in 1964.

In 2007, the 17th roller coaster was opened and gave Cedar Point the distinction of having the most roller coasters in the world; this ride is known as the Maverick. The Maverick was named the Best New Ride of 2007. Cedar Point is also known for the fastest and tallest roller coaster in the world, with the 420-foot tall, 120 m.p.h. Top Thrill Dragster.

"I like the Merry-Go-Round, personally. I am absolutely terrified of roller coasters and no, I do not plan on going any time soon," said junior Haley Ploucha.

"I am so excited for Cedar Point to open up again! I want to ride every roller caster at least once this summer, including my favorite ride, the Magnum, and hit up HalloWeekends a couple times," said junior Zach Bastian.

Dietary Supplements—You Have to Be Careful

Many athletes and body builders take dietary supplements to increase athletic performance and to increase muscle mass. What many people do not know, though, is that most of these supplements do not do what they are said to do and that they are unsafe.

Many supplements are not regulated by the Food and Drug Administration. This means that supplements can have ingredients that are not in the product listed and can also list ingredients in the product that are not in it.

Unlike medicine, supplements do not go under rigorous testing for effectiveness and safety. But, supplements that have the label USP, or United States Pharmacopoeia, have been tested and deemed safe.

The USP puts a label on the bottle indicating that the product has been tested and passed tests for dissolution, disintegration, potency, and purity.

One of the many users of dietary supplements at Cloverleaf High School is senior Sean Mohney.

"I only buy supplements that are clinically proven to be safe and effective," Mohney said. "I think diet is more important than supplementation. It's safe, effective, and you know what you are putting into your body."

Many "risky" supplements out there are anything that contains ephedrine, kava, androstenedione, yohimbine, GBL (gamma butyrolactone), GHB (gamma hy-

droxybutyric), and BD (butanediol). All of these, mixed with caffeine and aspirin, make it even more dangerous.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the International Olympic Committee (IOC), and the National Football League (NFL) have banned ephedrine and androstenedione. GBL, GHB, and BD are illegal and are known to cause serious illness and death.

Over 25 over-the-counter dietary supplements contain ephedrine, also known as ephedra. Ephedra, along with androstenedione and creatine are the most widely used by teenage athletes even though they are banned.

Another supplement taker is jun-

ior football player Joe Romanoff.

"I take them to help me regenerate after a lift," Romanoff commented. "I buy the cheapest, but I only take three supplements; two are protein supplements and the other is for post workout.

Most supplement takers do not think about the negative side effects of supplements. Many can cause permanent damage, stroke, heart attack, and even death. Taking high doses of the supplements can cause this as well.

Last Saturday, the girls' and boys' Varsity track teams traveled to and won the fifth annual Husky Invitational.

These included: Jen Foster breaking two meet records in high jump and 100 hurdles; Janelle Shaffer breaking the long jump meet record; and the 4x2 team consisting of Shaffer, Kelani Nuckols, Jenna Elswick and Taylor Detwiler breaking their own meet record from the previous year.

The boys' team beat Black River

131.5 to 117.5. Some first place wins for the boys included: Brian Livingstone in shot; Zack Miglich in long jump and 300 hurdles; and the 4x2 team consisting of Brandon Boltz, Adam Podolak, Bobby Ellis and Ryan Weir.

"It felt great to win. It was a great boost for the team and hopefully will help our team in the long run," said Podolak, a freshman.

"Everyone did really well," said the senior leader, Boltz.

The girls' team beat Northwestern 167.5 to 125. First place wins for the girls included: Foster in pole vault, high jump, 100 hurdles and 4x4; Shaffer in long jump, 4x2, 200 and 4x4; Detwiler in the 100, 4x2 and 4x1; Nuckols in the 4x2 and 4x4; Elswick in the 4x1, 4x2 and 4x4; and Katy Dean and Morgan Siegler in the 4x1.

"I am really happy that we were able to win the Husky Invite again. Both boys' and girls' teams did amazingly well even though the weather was horrible once again," said Dean, a junior.

The Varsity track team is looking forward to this meet again next year. They will be traveling to compete in the Amherst Relays this Saturday, and are excited to get to enjoy Hotdog Heaven once again.
