Our big school-wide initiative that we will be "kicking off" the month with is the Stop/Walk/Talk approach to bully prevention to encourage respectful behavior at Westfield Elementary. Be sure to ask your student about Stop/Walk/Talk and encourage them to utilize this approach at school and at home. Stop/Walk/Talk Approach



Starting this month, we will be emphasizing the Stop/Walk/Talk approach to bully prevention at Westfield Elementary. The Stop/Walk/Talk approach is a research-based system which reduces problem behaviors and improves school climate. It also blends with our school's theme which encourages students to be respectful, be responsible, be problem solvers, and be safe. Below are some main points of the Stop/Walk/Talk approach that students and staff will be utilizing...

Since disrespectful behaviors, like bullying, are often fueled by attention, we need to take away the attention! How? STOP/WALK/TALK:

If someone is doing something that is \underline{NOT} respectful, responsible or safe, then:

Step 1. Use the STOP Signal

- Hold out hand in front of you
- Make eye contact
- Say "stop" in a strong voice

If the person <u>continues</u> to do the behavior <u>after</u> you have used the stop signal then:

Step 2. WALK Away

- Say nothing
- Turn around calmly
- Remove yourself from the area

If the person <u>continues</u> to do the behavior <u>after</u> you have used the stop signal and <u>after</u> you have walked away then:

Step 3. TALK to a responsible adult

Responding When Someone Tells YOU to Stop

- 1. Stop what you are doing
- 2. Take a deep breath and count to 3
- 3. Go on with your day

This approach is currently being used in all of the Cloverleaf Elementary buildings (PreK-6th), and it will continue to be used once we move to the new building in January. Please encourage your child to use this approach at school (and at home) so that we can help keep Westfield a safe and respectful environment where students want to be!
