By working together as a team, teachers are able to draw on one another's strength and ideas that will help make instruction more meaningful and effective. With all the recent changes in education, time spent in Team Time as a group has had a positive impact on the education of our students.

Breakfast

This is a reminder that each day breakfast is available in the cafeteria for a small charge of \$1.00. Students who arrive at school early either by car or bus are permitted to enter the building and go directly to the cafeteria at 8:45 AM. They have the choice of either a hot or cold breakfast. (Only students who are attending Latchkey or are getting breakfast may enter the building before 9:00 AM.) Any student arriving in the cafeteria after the 9:00 AM bell will be permitted to purchase "breakfast in a bag" which does not include hot items. The student will take the breakfast to his or her homeroom. Anyone entering before 9:00 and eating in the cafeteria is to finish eating and get to homeroom by the 9:10 AM.

Halloween Parties

Cloverleaf Elementary School's Halloween parties are coming later this month. Most of them will be held on Friday, October 31. Please keep in mind that due to safety and space concerns, siblings of students are not permitted to accompany parents to class parties.

While not all of our students will be dressing up in a costume, many will be. Parents, please help your child adhere to a few simple guidelines as you plan with them what they will wear.

- Children are to come dressed in their costumes. Please do not send your children to school in costumes that restrict their participation in regular activities of the day (classroom, physical education, lunch, recess, etc.)
- Costumes should not be of a gruesome or grotesque nature nor should they reflect the dark side of the holiday. Costumes depicting blood, weapons, devils or evil witches will not be acceptable at Cloverleaf Elementary School.

WOW, the first month of school has flown by! I have been busy going into the 1st, 3rd and 5th grade classrooms to present Guidance Lessons.

Our 1st graders have been introduced to the word Brave with the book, *My Brave Year of Firsts* by Jamie Lee Curtis ... During this lesson they learn that it takes bravery to try something for the "first" time, especially when it doesn't quite go as you planned. But, there is a great sense of pride that you feel when you finally accomplish your goal! 1st graders are taught that they can take deep breaths, think positive thoughts, or ask someone to help/support them. Keep encouraging your child to try new things...even if it's hard and focus on those small accomplishments!

Our 3rd graders have learned a lot about acceptance when they were introduced to my "Crayon Box That Talked". Through this lesson 3rd graders have learned to appreciate each other's differences. We encourage everyone to give compliments and point out the positives. When we do this, we can all get along.

Our 5th graders are learning what it takes to be a leader. Their first lesson is on teamwork. To be a better teammate, 5th graders participated in a variety of team building activities. During these activities they had to practice listening to others ideas, taking turns, encouraging each other, and communicating in a non-defensive way to achieve a common goal. We are very proud of our 5th grade TEAM!

Good works: Character development is enhanced by opportunities to do good in the world. Volunteering to help at food banks, helping coach younger children, giving money to a family-chosen charity, helping your child's classroom teacher, -- all these efforts instill important habits in your children. But don't force them to help at the soup kitchen alone. Join them, and have a talk afterwards. These talks are definitely key. Of course it's hard to find time for such things, hard to interact with people who seem different and tempting to feel judgmental toward people who need help, but the payoffs can be enormous.

Character development begins at home and continues at school. As a parent, consider how you can bring some of your best character-building ideas to school. You can have a voice here at CES in choosing character-building reading materials, activities and speakers. Talk to Mrs. Thiry or Mrs. Stafiniski, your child's counselors, or your child's teachers, coaches, or principal about how you can contribute to the challenge of character development.

MRS. THIRY'S COUNSELOR'S CORNER

Over the years counselors and teachers have had many parents ask how to help their children develop positive personal qualities. We've heard questions such as: "My son is so selfish, how can I teach him to be generous?" "My daughter is always so angry and mean to her friends. What can I do to help her see that she should treat others with kindness and respect?" and "How can I get my child to be more honest?"

When it comes to character development, there is nothing more foolish than the old saying, "Do as I say, not as I do." Your children first need to **see virtue in action** in order to try out their "virtuewings". Parents, relatives, siblings, and childcare providers give children their first glimpses of courage, honesty, generosity, fairness and respect. It's not enough for your children to see you and other important adults and peers behaving virtuously. They also need encouragement, praise, and character feedback.

Encouragement: You can encourage your children with words or simply by showing faith in their positive potential. For the boy who is acting selfishly, you might say, "I'm going to stop reminding you to share because I know you can do it on your own." You can also actively notice your children's behavior when they do something positive. For example, when you see your daughter share her toys
